## Dear Families and Staff.

Today, we are very excited to welcome many students back to Chelsea High School! We know that many of our students, families, and staff have been eager to get back to in-person teaching and learning. For those who have opted to return, we have extensive health and safety protocols in place, including a mask requirement, physical distancing, frequent cleaning and sanitizing, symptom screening, regular testing, contact tracing, and more. These steps taken together, along with the low rates of community transmission, are making our schools safe to reopen.

We are also encouraged that so many of our older students have chosen to get the COVID-19 vaccine, now that the Pfizer vaccine has been approved for children ages 12 and older. The availability of the vaccine is the single most important development in bringing an end to the pandemic. I understand that some families continue to have concerns about getting the vaccine. Everyone must make their own decision. However, scientific evidence indicates that COVID-19 vaccines are proven to be safe and effective. Millions of people in the United States have received the vaccines under the most intense safety monitoring in U.S. history. For anyone who is interested in getting the vaccine for a student aged 12 or older, the City of Chelsea is holding walk-in clinics on weekends at the Chelsea Senior Center at 10 Riley Way (across from City Hall and behind the fire station). No appointment is needed. Interested residents can arrive at the Senior Center on Fridays from 3:00PM to 7:00PM and Saturdays and Sundays from 10:00AM-5:00PM. Parents and guardians do not need to be present when their child receives the vaccine. However, students must bring a screening form and written consent form signed by their parent.
